#### Staffing

## Testimonial David's Story



"I'm an older Sheridan student (41 years old) who never learned how to ride a bike, and have no one who can help me learn. My landlord is selling the house in which I rent a room, and because of that, I realized that I needed to learn to ride a bike. This would help me, given the housing crisis we are in, and that public transit in Oakville is expensive for my budget, and is not very frequent.

It took me about 12 hours, spread over about six sessions of practice at the Sheridan Bike Hub in Mississauga, for me to learn to ride a bike at a very rudimentary level, but I succeeded; I was a slow learner! But I was able to succeed because of the Bike Hub's support. The person who helped me (Vicki) was very patient with my questions, and was encouraging. This helped me to persevere despite my initial lack of confidence.

The bike hub also supplied me with a smaller bike with the pedals removed and seat lowered, for me to learn to balance with, before moving up to a proper sized bike with pedals. This is definitely something that I don't think I could do on my own (i.e. buy a separate smaller bike, and remove the pedals and lower the seat).

The encouragement, and ability to ask questions as I was learning (e.g. about how to turn, about how to switch gears, about how to mount and dismount, about problems I encountered with the chain) were necessary for me to succeed at learning to ride a bike.

I look forward to learning more about bike repair/maintenance and bike safety from the Bike Hub. This will allow me to use cycling as my main form of transportation for the rest of my life. This will allow me to be more adaptable with where I live, in this housing crisis."
